About Tarayana Foundation

Tarayana Foundation was founded by Her Majesty Gyalyum Dorji Wangmo Wangchuck. The Foundation was formally launched on 4th May 2003 by His Majesty The King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck, the then Crown Prince. The Foundation is a Public Benefit Organization, registered (Registration No. CSOA /PBO-08) with the Civil Society Organization Authority of Bhutan. It is governed by a Board of Directors, and the Board provides overall policy and strategic guidance. In addition, an Executive Committee is also instituted with the role of assisting the Board and supporting the Tarayana Foundation Secretariat in implementing the activities approved by the Board. The Secretariat plans, coordinates, and rolls out all interventions through a network of programme and field officers.



Message From The Founding President

In 2023, Tarayana Foundation soared to new heights, leaving an indelible mark of transformation across Bhutan's rural landscape. Celebrating two decades of unwavering service, the organization embarked on a journey of empowerment, empathy, and environmental stewardship. The 17th Tarayana Annual Fair in June marked a momentous milestone, where partners, supporters, and the vibrant Thimphu community converged to commemorate the 20th anniversary of grassroots empowerment. Over sixty community representatives from various districts joined in the celebration, igniting a collective spirit of service from the heart. As part of the anniversary festivities, I embarked on a profound journey, visiting project sites across Mongar, Trashigang, Lhuentse, and Pemagatshel. Witnessing firsthand the significant improvements in the quality of life for the communities served, a deep sense of satisfaction and purpose permeated the air. My interactions with Tarayana Club members and students further solidified my belief that compassionate young minds lead the way towards a brighter future. The inauguration of the TSHAR Institute in Kalapang, Mongar, heralded a new era of opportunity for bamboo farmers and artisans. This promising initiative aims to unleash the potential of this sustainable natural resource, revitalizing the rural economy while safeguarding local ecosystems. Expanding its reach, Tarayana completed six projects and launched seven new initiatives, extending its impact to the most disadvantaged and vulnerable communities. The introduction of the "Environment and Climate" program paved the way for numerous climate change adaptation and mitigation initiatives across rural areas, strengthening partnerships with local communities, development partners, and government agencies. Nature-based solutions, such as springshed management and sustainable land management, gained traction, with communities beyond project sites seeking similar support. The exploration of incorporating technology in springshed management further amplified the organization's commitment to effective service delivery. Fostering a synergistic relationship with colleges, Tarayana's partnership blossomed, welcoming more students to intern and gain hands-on experience in holistic rural development. These students found a fertile ground to apply their classroom learnings, working alongside seasoned field officers in areas such as community mobilization and skills development.

Committed to promoting equal access to education, Tarayana forged ahead in providing scholarship opportunities for underprivileged and promising students, ensuring that financial barriers do not hinder their academic pursuits. Investing in skills development initiatives empowered talented individuals and artisans in rural areas, enabling them to become agents of positive change within their communities. After a hiatus of four years, the annual pilgrimage to Bodh Gaya, India, resumed, allowing eight senior citizens from remote villages to partake in this spiritually enriching experience, nourishing their souls and strengthening their connection to their roots. The Foundation's subsidiary organizations Tarayana Micro Finance for Rural Development Pvt.Ltd., Folk Heritage Museum, Tarayana Rural Crafts, and Tarayana Centre for Research and Development - all made significant strides in achieving their respective goals and targets, contributing to the overall success of the organization. As Tarayana takes flight into the future, it does so with unwavering determination and confidence, driven by a vision of positive change within Bhutanese communities. 

arayana Foundation has strategically organized its initiatives into three primary categories: i) Social Development Programme, ii) Economic Development Programme, and iii) Environment and Climate. Each project/activities undertaken by the Foundation aligns with one of these overarching programmes, Govenment's plans, polices and SDGs. Amongst our notable endeavors are flagship initiatives like; the Housing Improvement Programme, Annual Pilgrimage Programme, and Scholarship and Learning Opportunities Programme, all of which are integral components of our Social Development Programme.

Social Development Programme



arayana Foundation's goal of contributing to a prosperous Bhutan have resulted in the facilitation of services and products/goods in the rural, remote and unreached parts of the country. The Foundation has worked to reduce the vulnerabilities of communities through several innovative, social development programmes. These have largely been implemented through Tarayana's field staff and a large number of volunteers, thus reflecting Bhutan's spirit of service and volunteerism.



i. Housing Improvement




The housing improvement programme is Tarayana's flagship programme which aims at reducing vulnerabilities in the rural communities of Bhutan. Since the inception of the Foundation in 2003, new and improved shelters with pour-flush toilets and home repair and renovations were facilitated through this programme in partnership with various organizations both from abroad and within the country.

a: Thai Housing Support

The Thai Housing Support was funded by Thai Philanthropists Khun Chia- Rug, Pha-ma-haAwon, Khun Ra-we-wan, Dr. Pun-Ya-Phat, Rung-na-Pha, mobilized by Tarayana Dragons Motorcycle Club. It was implemented from 2020 to May 2023 at Remadu, Kamalung, Gakhar, Trong, Dalibi, Kamati, Ongkhar, Chapganpa, Wangphu, Pramaling under Bjoka block of Zhemgang district. The project aims to reduce poverty in remote communities of Bhutan through the holistic development model that provides access to modest homes, better nutrition, skills development, and income generating opportunities to improve their living standards.

Number of Houses and Toilets constructed, and Houses renovated under Thai Housing Project





b: Housing Support at Mewangang, Goshing Block, Zhemgang

The Housing Support at Mewangang under Goshing block was funded by an individual donor Ms. Sonam Choden in the memory of her late father. It was implemented from September 2021 to May 2023. The five houses were supported with water and sanitation facilities.







The Tarayana President's Award was presented posthumously to Mr. Richard C. Blum by Hon'ble Founding President for transforming thousands of lives across Bhutan through housing improvement, economic and social empowerment



Mr. Richard C. Blum through the American Himalayan Foundation provided a financial support amounting to US dollar one million for a project, "Integrated Community Development for Poverty Reduction". This project was initiated in 2018 to 2020 which benefitted more than 500 households across 13 districts in the country. It was able to empower vulnerable rural communities with hope and opportunities to improve their lives and livelihoods. Ms. Heidi J. Blum and her family visited Wangkha in Toedwang block under Punakha district in 2023. During their visit the Blum family was able to interact with the communities and witness firsthand the impacts and changes that their support has created. The communities expressed their gratitude and thanked the Blum family for their generous

support.

ii. Annual Pilgrimage

A fter a hiatus of four years, the annual pilgrimage to Bodh Gaya, India finally resumed in 2023. Eight senior citizens from the most remote villages of Pemagatshel, Dagana and Samtse embarked on a spiritual journey from 14th to 24th January 2024. The Annual Pilgrimage Programme was initiated in 2008 to commemorate the Coronation of His Majesty The Druk Gyalpo Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck. Every year a group of senior citizens from the rural communities are supported to go for pilgrimage and they are accompanied by the Foundation staff to take care of their logistic needs. Till date, more than 100 senior citizens have benefited from this Programme.

iii. Food and Nutrition Security



R ood and nutrition security is an essential component of the holistic rural development approach that Tarayana promotes. Since the inception of the Foundation, the Field Officers have been providing necessary support, guidance, and facilitation in promoting backyard gardens for every households in the respective sites. This initiative complements the tremendous efforts undertaken by the Department of Agriculture under the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock in fulfilling the objective of food self-sufficient village. Supports are provided in the form of inputs, capacity building, and market facilitation.

This programme contributes towards fulfilling many targets under SDGs, specifically SDG 1. and targets 1.4: By 2030, ensure that all men and women, in particular the poor and the vulnerable, have equal rights to economic resources, as well as access to basic services, ownership and control over land and other forms of property, inheritance. It also contributes towards KPI 6.4: Poorest households without proper dwelling under NKRA 3. The support to WASH facilities contributes immensely towards KPI 6.2: Poorest households without proper sanitation (pour-flush toilet) under NKRA 3 and targets 6.2: By 2030, achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene for all and end open defecation... and 6.b: Support and strengthen the participation of local communities in improving water and sanitation management under SDG 6.

a: Food Security in Bhutan Through Professionalized Self-Help Groups (SHGs)

The Project Food Security in Bhutan Through Professionalized Self-Help Groups (SHGs) funded by Bhutan Foundation spans over a period of one year from May 2022 to June 2023. Through this project, 10 Self-Help Groups (SHGs) have been formed, marking a pivotal step towards fostering and achieving the objective of self-reliance. Extensive capacity-building sessions were carried out for the SHG members with sessions covering essential topics like; Group Management, Financial Literacy, Marketing Strategies, Communication Skills, and Leadership Development. Bylaws were developed for all SHGs and the elected office bearers members to manage the group functioning.

The groups also initiated savings to sustain the activities. The objectives of the project were;

- Contribute to the development of sustainable, inclusive, resilient, and climate-adapted agriculture for food systems and nutrition security in Bhutan
- By strengthening SHGs to become professional and sustainable economic players in the value chain
- By providing SHGs with access to technical knowledge, markets, and finance



b: Nutrition Sensitive Agriculture

The project Nutrition Sensitive Agriculture ealier known as Nutrition & Health Advocacy to Help Rural and Vulnerable Population Groups Consume & Stay Healthy During the COVID-19 Pandemic & Beyond was implemented from January 2022 to March 2023 with the funding from World Food Programme (WFP). The main objective of the project is to promote health and nutrition as a defensive mechanism to strengthen immunity at a community level.



In 2023, with technical support from the LINGZHI Food, 11 Tarayana Field Officers completed Training of Trainer program in Food Processing. Thereafter, these Field Officers imparted these skills to the communities in their respective sites. In addition, an awareness campaign on the importance of Nutrition and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) were carried out, which were attended by 492 male members and 539 female members at the target sites. A post-harvest management training was conducted with both theoretical and practical sessions and was attended by 397 male and 489 female participants.





A sensitization session on nutrition, crop varieties, water, sanitation & health, and the importance of physical activities for health to fight against diseases was carried out for Agriculture Extension Officers, Livestock Officers, Frontline Health Workers, and Community Influencers. A total of 360 males and 484 females attended the session. A cooking competition was also organized at the block and district levels. In total, 155 males and 201 females participated in the competition.



The findings, lessons learned, and recommendations from all the community consultations were presented to the relevant stakeholders in all the target districts. The participants of 98 males and 88 females, including district officers, local leaders, and community representatives attended the session in the four target districts held at the respective district headquarters.



c: Collaboration in Support of Irrigation Materials for the Establishment of Dryland Irrigation and Electric Fencing

The project was Funded by Commercial Agriculture and Resilient Livelihoods Enhancement Programme (CARLEP) and International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) through the Agriculture Research and Development Centre (ARDC) based in Mongar, under the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock.

The main objective of the project is to improve rural livelihood through the provision of quality and timely delivery of extension services. It is being implemented in the targeted sites of Pemagatshel, Trashigang, Mongar and Lhuentse districts.

The achievements of the project in 2023 are;

• A joint monitoring was carried out by the ARDC Wengkhar, the block administration and the Tarayana team at Sekpa village under Jurmed block in Mongar

• A total of three water tanks were completed: In-tank (01), Service tank (01), and a Reservoir tank by the community members of Sekpa

• Electric fencings were installed at Langabi (1.5 km), Yangsibi (1.2 km), and Nunmaling (1.5 km) villages under Menbi block, Lhuntse

• The Vegetable Group in Bangyul village, Dungmaed block under Pemagatshel district installed a Solar Dryer to dry their surplus vegetables more efficiently. The dryer has a capacity to dry approximately 250-300 kgs of fresh vegetables at a time, and helps maintain hygiene in the process.

iv. Scholarships and Learning Opportunities



In 2023, the Foundation in collaboration with national and international universities facilitated scholarships for 10 students. Currently there are 28 scholarship recipients pursuing their further studies in Regents International School, Bangkok, Norbuling Rigter College, Paro, Maharishi Markandeshwar (Deemed to be University) India, and Royal Thimphu College, Thimphu.

Sixteen students graduated in 2023, 13 from Norbuling Rigter College, Paro and three from Regent's International School, Thailand.



a: Professional Development

wenty-three youths, 18 female & 5 male from Sherubtse College, Norbuling Rigter College, Samtse College of Education, and Royal Thimphu College interned with the Foundation in 2023. The interns were attached to different divisions based on their interest and subject backgrounds. They were also given an opportunity to go to the project sites to learn about socio-economic issues of disadvantaged communities, engage with the community members enabling them to gain real life experiences.



b: Tarayana Clubs

Tarayana Clubs in schools and colleges was instituted since 2004 to promote the spirit of volunteerism amongst the students. The clubs carry out various social activities within and beyond their schools and institutes. Currently, there are 130 Tarayana Clubs with more than 5800 members across Bhutan. Three new clubs were formed in Royal Thimphu College, Yangchen Gatshel Lower Secondary School in Thimphu and Gyalpozhing Higher Secondary School in 2023.

c: Annual Green Technology Challenge

The 10th Annual Green Technology Challenge was held on 29th May at the College of Science and Technology (CST). The theme revolved around the critical aspect of Cold Storage, addressing the need for efficient preservation methods. The challenge was coorganized by the Centre for Renewable and Sustainable Energy Development (CRSED) and the Electrical Engineering Department in collaboration with CST FabLab. This event aimed to promote environmentally friendly solutions and encourage the adoption of sustainable practices





iv: Skills Training

he Foundation provides various training to enhance the capacity and skills of community members in collaboration with different sectors and organizations. In 2023 a total of 3411 (1607 male and 1804 female) community members were trained in the following categories: Agriculture, financial literacy, social auditing and accountability, sustaianble land management, youths and women rights, and Self Help Group Management etc.




Economic Development Programme



Supporting rural communities of Bhutan in securing a better future through sustained livelihood and enhancing access to financial services has been the primary objective of the Foundation. Therefore, the Foundation has made every effort in ensuring that communities are able to help themselves by empowering them economically through activities ranging from skill development to promoting income generation activities and facilitating farm to market for their products.





i: Promoting Integrated Bamboo Based Enterprise Development Among SAARC Countries



The project was supported by SAARC Development Fund from July 2017 to March 2023. The project with an objective to promote bamboo-based enterprises for income generation and employment opportunities, was implemented in two districts of Mongar and Pemagatshel. Gondue, Silambi and Saling in Mongar district and Ngangla, Gozhing, and Bjoka in Zhemgang.

Project achievements are:

• Two Community Facility Centers (CFCs) with appropriate bamboo machines were operationalized. Eleven machines (vacuum pressure impregnation plant, knot cleaning machine, laser engraving machine, thin slicing machine, radial splitter machine, handicrafts toolkit, manual splitter, belt disc sander machine, turning machine lathe & cross saw) were installed at TSHAR Institute. At Bjoka CFC, four machines have been installed (bamboo pole cutting machine, knot removal machine, thick slicing machine, treatment pot set and laser engraving machine).

• A total of 1,612 bamboo farmers were trained in the scientific way of bamboo plantation and management practices, bamboo harvesting techniques, bamboo shoot processing, packaging, food handling and safety measures, bamboo post-harvest processing, bamboo seasoning, storage, grading, and sorting. Nurseries were established at the two CFCs to demonstrate the various species of bamboo as well as for the use during training programmes and farmers were encouraged to set up bamboo nurseries within their respective land as well.

Dorji Wangchuk, a 22-year-old class 10 dropped out youth was among the seven participants who went on an exposure and a knowledge sharing visit to India. Previously, I used to work with wood carpentry, but it had many challenges. Trees take years to grow, and there are lot of competitions in the wood carpentry market. However, with bamboo, there is less competition currently, and bamboo only takes two to three years to grow, so I decided to shift my focus to bamboo carpentry.

Environment and Climate Programme



Tarayana works with some of the most disadvantaged communities in the country with high poverty incidences. These communities have very limited adaptive capacity and coping mechanisms for climate induced risks. Most of the communities are also located in high climate variability zones, which further increases their risk of climate hazards. Due to climate change, the livelihood options of the communities are challenged by water scarcity, increased pests and diseases, declined crop yield, and human-wildlife conflicts, further aggravating food insecurity, and so on. Through diverse interventions, the Foundation builds and enhances the capacities of the communities to cope with the impacts and risks of climate change.










In 2023, the project achieved significant milestones;

- The completion of a value chain study for five NWFPs
- The successful conclusion of a month-long bamboo furniture training at TSHAR Institute for the initial cohort of trainees from Tading in Samtse district
- The establishment of 27 Water User Groups spanned across project sites, alongside training sessions on invasive plant management conducted in these areas
- Twenty-nine Water Harvesting Schemes were established in seven districts
- A sensitization and feasibility study on Sustainable Land Management were carried out in Metakha and Loggchina block in Chukha district
- Sustainable Land Management training at Zochhaling village under Tading block, Samtse district
- A Training on identifying, removing, and disposing of invasive plants at Tading and Dorokha (Samtse), Loggchina and Metakha (Chukha)

ii: Climate-Resilient Water Management in Rural Bhutan

Ist November 2023, with a project duration until 31st March 2025. Focused on Lichibi village under Goshing block of Zhemgang district, the project aims to enhance water management practices to withstand the challenges posed by climate change. The field visits for water source data collection have been conducted. This included tasks such as obtaining GPS coordinates, measuring physical parameters, and collecting samples for chemical testing. Additionally, vital lithology data has been gathered.

iii: Developing Climate Resilient Communities Through Appropriate Adaptation and Mitigation Interventions at Yagyur and

This project is implemented by the Foundation with the financial support from the GEF/Small Grants Programme, UNDP Bhutan and Royal Goverment of Bhutan. The objective of the project is to reduce Human-Wildlife Conflicts, thereby contributing to food security and sustainability for enhancing livelihood. The second objective is to enhance water sustainability by catchment conservation through community participation. The sites for this project are at Yagyur and Khengzor under Pemagatshel district. The achievements under the project in 2023 are;

- Constructed 15,000-litres water reservoir tank
- Conducted Self-Help Group Management Training (45 participants -30F & 15M), Operation & Maintenance Training of electric fencing (45 participants -30F & 15M), Financial Literacy, Communication Skills, and Time Management Training (30 participants-20F & 10M)
- Installed electric fencing at Yagyur village covering 54 acres of cultivated land and covering 73.9 acres of cultivated land at Khengzor village

iv: Enhance the Resilience of the Grassroots Communities to Adapt to Climate Change Through the Promotion of Agroforestry

The project funded by Stiftung Drittes, Third Millennium Foundation is implemented in four blocks under three districts of Trashigang, Tashiyangtse and Dagana for the span of three years from January 2023 to December 2025. The objectives of the project are:

- Improve farmer's livelihoods through capacity building on climate resilient farming techniques and technologies that are more efficient and will enhance income generation
- To improve land productivity and soil fertility through sustainable land management practices
- Enhanced water sustainability by protecting recharge areas and catchment conservation through community participation
- Initiate community seed banking and food processing for sustainable production and consumption
- Facilitate access to credit for small holder farmers all through using gender sensitive and agro biodiversity approaches

Project achievements of 2023 are



• Conducted community consultation meeting, resource mapping exercise, community need assessment and planning



• Carried out capacity building in climate-resilient farming techniques, and on nursery management in Lumang block in December 2023



• Seed management training was carried out at two villages Paksay and Gibsa under Khebisa, Dagana district, where 79 participants (28M & 49F) attended

• Two farmers' seed groups were formed with bylaws developed, the groups are officially registered with the National Seed Centre in Bajo for marketing and seed production



- Under the springshed management initiatives, the project constructed two reservoir tanks (20,000 ltrs) at Khesingri and Dhungmanba and installed 15 water taps and a filtration tank each in the two villages
- Five filtration tanks were completed, and three Water User Groups were formed in Nindha Village in Tashiyangtse
- Two reservoir tanks along with filtration (10,000 ltrs), were constructed at Taktsagoenpa and Menchuna village. A total of 16 water taps were installed. Additionally, two Water User Groups were formed, and bylaws were developed in Khebisa block, Dagana district



Advocacy and Awareness

i: Secondary Urban Towns Development Project, BHU-3674 Department of Engineering Services (DES), MoWHS

The Secondary Urban Towns Development Project, BHU-3674, executed by the Department of Engineering Services (DES), Ministry of Infrastructure and Transport, funded by the Asian Development Bank, was implemented in Trashigang, Sarpang, and Samdrup Jongkhar to mobilize experts to implement a Gender Action Plan (GAP). The activities carried out in 2023 are: Completion of the Endline Survey Report and Gender Action Plan Implementation Report.

ii: Strengthening the Rights of Youth and Women in Rural Communities Through Human Rights–Based Approach to Development.

This project was implemented from October 2022 to September 2023, with funding support from the European Union through the International IDEA and Helvetas Bhutan, in 10 villages in three blocks of Haa, Samtse, and Trongsa districts.

The Objectives of the project were;

- To increase awareness and knowledge among the youth and women about their legal rights through capacity development and participatory awareness programmes
- To promote a culture for participation of the youths and women in development planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the development programmes in their areas
- To strengthen the capacity of local leaders by imparting training in relation to human rightsbased approach so as to enhance delivery of quality services and engagements in the communities

The achievements of the project are;

- During the interface meetings between community members and local leaders, Awareness of the Local Development Planning Processes and the Local Government Act 2009 was created
- Trained Youth and Women members of the communities in Personal Advancement and Career Enhancement (P.A.C.E), focusing on Communication, Problem Solving and Decision Making, Time and Stress Management, and Leadership. A total of 184 (118F & 66M) attended the training



• A policy dialogue session was conducted at Samtse district, involving community representatives and local leaders from Tading block. During this session, a report on action planning from the block was presented to decision makers at the district level, sparking a series of dialogues aimed at educating on inclusive governance. Sector heads participated actively in addressing issues, showcasing their dedication to overcoming challenges and promoting a future that is inclusive and empowering for all • To foster community vitality through transparency, integrity and ownership for enhanced service delivery in the community, Social Auditing and Accountability training through the adoption of the Community Score Card tool was conducted. The total of 397 participants (250M & 129F) attended the training against the target of 140 participants. A video documentation has been launched to document the outcomes of the project, which will be leveraged as a primary tool for promoting the work on various social media platforms



Lolay



he celebration of Lolay on Nyilo (Winter Solstice) is an annual event at the museum. It is an age-old tradition practiced in the Western districts of Wangdue Phodrang, Punakha, Haa, and Paro. The Folk Heritage Museum has taken initiatives to revive this fading tradition and to create awareness among children about the importance of Lolay and Nyilo on 2nd and 3rd January 2023, Lolay recitation at Lingkana Palace and Minister enclave as well as in other various organizations.

Jakar Dung Zimchung Renovation



The extensive renovation of the Jakar Dung Zimchung, initiated on 29th June 2023, has made a significant progress. With the internal boundary wall already completed, attention has now shifted to the outer stone boundary wall, with approximately 80% of its construction already completed. Crucially, all necessary repairs, from replacing unstable wood to addressing cracks, have been diligently executed.

The renovation of the Jakar Dung Zimchung is an important initiative that celebrates and cherishes the achievements undertaken by our Queens of Bhutan. It is the symbol of Bhutan's commitment to curating and exhibiting crucial roles women have played in shaping the country's narrative.





arayana Rural Crafts is the production and marketing arm of the Foundation, which works closely with thousands of artisans and hundreds of Self Help-Groups across the country in improving and marketing products from rural villages. Each product is painstakingly handmade by artisans whose families have been involved in the craft for many generations using locally available natural materials. The artisans are provided with the required tools and skills to revive traditional arts and crafts on one hand and help them adapt to new market demands on the other.

The organization is now getting registered as a separate Civil Society Organization, Bhutan Association of rural Artisans, under the Royal Patronage of Her Majesty Gyalyum Dorji Wangmo Wangchuck.

In 2023, more than Nu. 2.1 millions worth of products were marketed through different outlets of Tarayana Rural Crafts. TRC also collaborated with women social entrepreneurs like She Bhutan, Colours of Bhutan, Yarn and Yathra, and Thokmed. In a move towards expansion, TRC introduced new outlets in the Cottage and Small Industry (CSI) market and Dochula Druk Wangyel Complex. Additionally, in a stroke of creative brilliance, TRC teamed up with an artist to craft exquisite Taktsang postcards, set to be retailed exclusively at the Taktsang Café.

Tarayana Centre for Research and Development (TCRD) is the research branch and think tank of the Foundation for action-oriented research that is grounded in people's lived realities and aspires to inform key development debates and policy dialogues. This is pursued through research, documentation, monitoring, and evaluation of the Tarayana Foundation's many interventions in the field with most remote and vulnerable communities in Bhutan. The centre focuses on practical implementation of interventions using bottom-up approach and provides useful insights for national, regional, and global policy formulation initiatives. TCRD complements the Tarayana Foundation in realizing its vision of a happy and prosperous Bhutan by working towards three research themes:

- Adapting to Climate Change and building Climate Resilience in rural communities
- Enhancing Sustainable Livelihoods
- Supporting Youth and Women

Bhutanese Knowledge for Indigenous Development (B-KIND)

he B-KIND research project engages in a transdisciplinary, feminist political-ecological approach to understanding the multifaceted, and interconnected characteristics of natural resource management and integrated food systems- in the context of climate change in Bhutan. Political ecology explores the political-economic and socio-cultural forces that affect and are affected by ecological, environmental, and bio-physical trends. Biophysical research led by CNR focuses on mapping climate, livelihood, and food system vulnerabilities through scientific quantitative assessments of organic agriculture, climate adaptation, food systems, food and nutrition security, gender, and climate change, and the socioeconomics of food processing, distribution, value addition, economic trade-off analysis. It also explores bio-physical and ecological areas, including human-wildlife conflicts, climate vulnerabilities and adaptation, resilient livelihoods, food production, and distribution. The Project is funded by International Development Research Centre (IDRC), Govt. of Canada



Petari in Punakha – Climate Resilient Irrigation

A ter pipelines of 0.4 km laid in the seepage and erosion prone areas of Petari, Punakha district to address water shortage for rice cultivation have benefited the community. Six organic farmers in Petari are provided with the green houses for vegetable production for nutrition security. The greenhouses were installed on the "learn while doing" approach with the project assisting the community with technical assistance to install initial polyhouses and community completing the rest of the installations. Similarly, drip irrigation pipe layout as water saving technology and raised bed preparation for vegetable production were demonstrated and the members installed the drip lines and prepared bed for plantation.



Laya – Food and Nutrition Security

Five trench greenhouses were constructed in Laya, Gasa district for the vegetable production for food and nutrition security of the households. Cameras and data loggers were installed for real time monitoring and data recording. Vegetable production data collection is ongoing.



Kumbu in Gangtey In-conversion to Organic

Action research pilot started with 10 households under Kumbu village, Wangdue district to practice organic farming on potato production. Data collection and analysis on the cost of production, yield and yield components, to compare the in-conversion to organic and conventional are completed for the first year of trial.

Tarayana MicroFinance was established in 2020 by the Founding President with the vision of providing access to microcredit for rural development and aims to enable the rural communities of Bhutan to help themselves come out of poverty with accelerated income growth.

In 2023, TMF surpassed expectations by an impressive 13.88%, exceeding its financial year end target. With a strong focus on supporting communities, TMF sanctioned loans to 704 borrowers across 19 districts, with the exception of Bumthang. Out of 704 borrowers 370 are female borrowers and 334 are male borrowers. The total gross loan portfolio amounted to Nu. 44,624,091, indicating the substantial impact TMF has had on empowering individuals and businesses. Furthermore, the annual turnover for TMF in 2023 stood at Nu. 9,77,902.57, reflecting its robust financial performance and commitment in fostering economic growth and development.



Grant Project Execution and Implementation

The City of Vienna grant for women in Lhuntse has successfully completed all disbursements, ensuring that all 35 women beneficiaries have received their mini tillers. Meanwhile, under the project "Promoting Agroforestry for Climate Change Adaptation" aimed at enhancing the resilience of grassroot communities in Bhutan, 24 beneficiaries in Lumang under Trashigang district and 29 beneficiaries in Khebisa under Dagana district, have been supported.
